NEW LIFE RADIO (NLR)—Carrying on the mission despite the actions of men and nations

Psalm 33:10-12 The Lord brings the counsel of the nations to nothing; He makes the plans of the peoples of no effect. The counsel of the Lord stands forever, the plans of His heart to all generations. Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord...

164 days of war have passed since the start of Russia's invasion of Ukraine and New Life Radio continues its service of proclaiming Christ and Him crucified to warring nations and suffering people. We have the privilege to carry out Christ's command to proclaim the Gospel via radio, but as in every generation, such service often calls one to extreme challenges, and for the NLR radio missionaries, this summer is proving to be a time of great challenge, but also, new opportunities!

Ever since our relocation from Moscow to Odessa in summer 2019, leaving the restrictions of Russia for the openness of Ukraine, our staff has devoted all their efforts to providing listeners with outstanding Bible teaching, Christian music, and encouragement to develop and strengthen disciples across the Russian-speaking Slavic world. We had a nice facility in Odessa and simply focused on our daily routine of radio air shifts, recording, contacting Christians, collating information, and programming it all to the best of our ability. We just minded our own business and went about the task of putting New Life Radio on our telecom networks.

Then February 24th came and the world started to change. We quickly organized an alternate studio for NLR in Romania, while keeping our operations going in Odessa. In June, NLR added new staff, even as the intensity of the war heated up against this city. We thought perhaps it would be a Russian bomb that would end NLR's Odessa operation. But strangely enough, it was a Ukrainian law that did the job, and this brings

us to today.

In July, President Zelensky signed a restrictive mass media law that essentially bans the use of Russian language and music on radio across Ukraine. Part of a derussification war policy, this act will force CRFR to relocate NLR's broadcast transmission facility outside of the country.

FORTUNATELY, the remote NLR studio in lasi. Romania is able to fully program the radio network, bypassing the restrictions this law imposes on us. We also have time to plan and work out a long term solution to this dilemma. CRFR has determined that Budapest, Hungary will be our next site to house a transmission and studio facility for NLR's Russian service. Our team will begin the technical setup there by September 1st and connect it with our Odessa studios.

Because CRFR is the legal broadcast entity that transmits over the Hotbird satellite channel and controls www.NLRadio.net, we should be able to isolate the Odessa production center from legal entanglements forced by this media law. This will increase our cost of operation somewhat (estimated at \$2000 more per month for studio space. telecom payments, and two staff persons) and may cause additional organizational changes, but we believe our mission partners will step up to help us in this crisis.

We are confident that the Lord will show us the proper solution to continuing our radio service to listeners across Russia, Ukraine, and the former Soviet Union, while staying in our current Odessa studios. But that could change as well, as the city is undergoing constant attack by Russian bombing.

As some doors close, God opens up others, and even as we deal with the problems of operating a Russian service in a new way, we are gearing up to develop a new version of NLR in Ukrainian, called Pa∂io Hose життя. This is an opportunity to broadcast in two languages to serve Ukraine independently from Russia, and the 43% of the population that speaks Russian.

NLR Ukraine: A progress report



In our last report, we provided a fairly comprehensive overview of how a Ukrainian network could develop, eventually transmitting over satellite radio as a prelude to developing local FM radio affiliates across Ukraine.

Two aspects of this--financing and programming--are still in the early stages of our strategy that includes supporting 3 to 4 new missionary staff; and compiling teaching and music resources to fill a 24/7 broadcast schedule. While we need new sponsors for the staff, we have gone ahead and committed funds from our NLR-Russia budget to hire one program director for the new station, who will be responsible for all aspects of programming. A radio automation system is now being built that will be used to organize the daily radio format into broadcasts.

With the advent of this new media law, we will need to step up this process dramatically, in order to get a minimal Ukrainian broadcast transmitting on the Internet by October or November while affording us time to complete the staffing and program acquisition. In the meantime, our staff will remain in Odessa and work as independent missionaries and Ivan will stay in lasi to oversee all network functions for the Russian service. The law states that restrictions on media will last until Ukraine recovers all of its territory, including Crimea, so we don't expect to get back to normal any time soon. Unfortunately, the Ukrainian government is taking excessive actions against Russians and anything connected to Russia, so we hope our new Ukrainian broadcasts will cause local officials to relax their guard and leave the NLR staff alone.

We don't know how things will turn out, but we know the Gospel needs to be communicated to Russia and Ukraine, and the Church in these lands can greatly benefit from access to solid Christian instruction and a clear teaching of basic Christian doctrines. It is time for meat, rather than milk, and proclaiming HOPE rather than the pessimism that is felt everywhere in a nation being systematically destroyed. Our staff will gladly dish it out soon in both languages, the Lord willing!

CRFR has a proposed minimum budget of \$5200/month to have a three staff satellite/internet radio operation from our Odessa studios.
